Dear Judy and RCC public meeting sub-committee members,

I would like to comment on the RCC's plan to sponsor a public meeting (prior to and separate

from the anticipated public presentation by the ACFC of their trail design and revised

management plan for the Andrews Community Forest).

My understanding from attending recent ACFC and RCC meetings is that the idea to hold this

additional, separate meeting was a result of committee members recognizing there was a 'clear

desire' specifically for a public forum on conservation and recreation and that the RCC would be

a 'good fit' as sponsor for this topic. I agree and applaud this effort.

As the specific speakers, topics, and format are now being discussed by the RCC, I suggest that

the RCC consider the following as they make plans and seek speakers for this meeting:

1. 1. A primary focus for the RCC meeting should be to provide outdoor enthusiasts of all kinds

and the public in general an opportunity to learn about the effects of trail-based recreation on conservation.

To most people the obvious impact of things like housing developments, mining activities, and road construction on wildlife and natural resources are clear. However,

the effects of trail-based recreation are less obvious and less known to the public.

Today, however, largely because of the massive boom in all types of outdoor recreation,

understanding effects of trail-based recreation is a critical new issue we must consider. And here in VT where there is a large proportion of residents who enjoy the

outdoors in various ways as well as the fact that VT is often marketed to others as an

"outdoor recreation paradise", it behooves us to clearly understand and educate ourselves on what is known about the impact of trail-based recreational activities

on conservation.

2. This meeting is an opportunity for Richmond citizens to understand the latest science and

technology from a conservation perspective that is relevant to trail-based recreation. There are

several individuals in our relatively local area who have the qualifications and scientific

background to present informative and enjoyable presentations that include up-to-date science

and others who have experience in systems/technology for locating trails that are aimed at

mitigating environmental effects. I understand the sub-committee is vetting a number of

different individuals who may fulfill these criteria.

3. The public should hear directly from those with expertise as noted above. Each speaker

could give a short presentation to be followed by a moderated panel discussion 'of the whole'

that includes giving the public the opportunity to ask "live" questions and participate in the discussion.

Recognizing the key role that the Conservation Commission plays in our town, I hope you will

provide a forum that helps all of us in Richmond make fully informed decisions about the best

way to proceed with ACF plans.

Judy, I hope these comments are helpful and I would appreciate it if you would please bring

them to the attention of the full committee at your next meeting. Thank you. Nancy Zimny
