176	a swale that was forming between Esplanade/Church St, runoff behind Tilden Ave,					
177	multiple sections of Cochran Rd and Dugway Rd. Arneson stated that he visited all					
178	seven sites with the representative and none of them qualify as he explained it is more					
179	about protecting structures from bank erosion threat of a river or a stream.

186	Furr stated that the damage from this flood did not reach the epic proportions of July but					
187	in order to qualify for FEMA reimbursement, things have to cost a certain amount. Furr					
188	stated that it does not appear that Chittenden County is going to have enough damage to					
189	qualify for FEMA declaration. Furr reviewed the roadway flooding as a small mudslide					
190	on Kenyon Road, two driveway culverts on Stage Rd, and small erosion to the sides of					
191	roads that was repaired within days.					
192						
193	Furr reviewed Volunteers Green flooding as the flagpole/monument were tipped over and					
194	formed a large crater, a small amount of pavement in the parking lot that was torn up.					
195	Furr stated that the Highway staff has reset the flagpole and monument, smoothed the					
196	area, ordered new mulch, and found a replacement slide. Furr stated that the park road					
197	has a large area of silt deposits stretching from behind the Bandstand to the second					
198	baseball field. Furr reviewed that the Highway staff remove as much of it as possible					
199	without damaging the grass and reset the dugout poles. Furr reviewed that the concession

stand and restrooms received a lot of silt and will need to be disinfected and drywall

- 201 replaced perhaps with pressure treated plywood instead.
- 202

Furr stated that there was water in the crawlspace under the Post Office and a sump pump was able to get most of the water out and we will be hiring 4SmartProLLC to clean up the remaining water.

206

207 Furr stated that the biggest damage from the flood was the tree that caught on the Bridge 208 Street bridge damaged the sewer line as it is bent, not leaking but lost a lot of insulation. 209 Furr stated that it's going to cost at least \$24,000 to replace that due to the scaffolding to 210 access the pipe. Furr stated that the water pump house had some water in the clear well, 211 but the pump was turned off prior to the flood, the clear wells were cleaned and tested 212 and back online. Furr stated that the wastewater treatment facility typically processes 213 about 60 to 70,000 gallons of wastewater per day but during the flood it processed 214 1,173,000 gallons as of 3pm. Furr stated that there was a 20-minute period where the 215 water was not fully treated, and this was quickly corrected. Furr reviewed that a lot of 216 repairs to the plant are part of the 20-year engineering study. Hill reviewed that most of 217 this is within the purview of the Water Sewer Commission and paid for by customers. 218

Furr summarized the discussion of the use of Browns Court for recreation and housing
and a potential housing summit. Furr identified the recreational constituency of our
Town where people need recreational opportunities and the housing constituency and a
potential housing summit that includes how much of it is affordable and at what level.
Hill summarized the opportunity with ARPA funds to improve recreation along with the

- housing crisis. Hill asked if it is possible or desirable to do multiple things at Browns
- Court. Hill asked if the Town has a role in addressing housing. Furr reviewed the ARPA
- survey summary of recreation categories, descriptions, and number of items suggested:

Carroll asked about progress on the surveying of the land on Browns Court. Carroll
thought a housing summit would be helpful in determining housing needs. Forward
agreed with Carroll and thought a survey might be an action item. Barnard stated that
Tuesday December 19, the Town of Richmond hired Chris Haggerty to do the survey
done by the second week of January.

256 Miller asked what other specific spots in the Town will there be in the future for housing, 257 and recreation together. Miller stated that if it's a popular spot for recreation good, but 258 it's going to increase traffic and there's going to be a problem at that intersection on the 259 road. Miller suggested a map of what our land use might be in 20 years. Forward stated 260 that one value of a summit is to invite people who build affordable housing and discuss 261 what is affordable housing. Thomas stated that there was a study from not long ago that 262 shows places that could have housing. Clarke stated that the Planning Commission is 263 talking with Jolina Ct about more units. Clarke confirmed that both the Housing 264 Committee and Planning Commission have struggled with the affordable part of housing 265 for a long time and have pivoted to more housing. LaBounty stated that our community 266 needs housing in general and homes at a starter home value. LaBounty agreed with 267 Forward that a summit would define affordable housing outside of HUD, determine who 268 can build it, identify if the Town buys property, use current resources, and detail the 269 history of existing affordable housing projects in Richmond. LaBounty expressed 270 concern as an ARPA committee member about a summit and the postponed use of the 271 recreational money. LaBounty stated that Browns Court is the only land that the Town 272 owns that is not in the floodplain. LaBounty reviewed that the Richmond Land Trust 273 bought the Bombardier Meadow in Jonesville as a community recreational resource. 274 LaBounty confirmed that she is not opposed to the summit, but it should not hold up the 275 Parks committee's recommendation to the Selectboard. Furr stated that the ARPA 276 committee does have to make allocations this calendar year so there is not time to do all 277 this research. Hill stated that it's appropriate to move forward with both with more 278 nuanced conversation about space and use and desirability. Hill stated that there's a lot of 279 evidence that the free market has not solved the housing crisis in Vermont. Hill asked 280 what we can learn from our neighboring towns. Miller stated that for affordable housing, 281 Brown Ct does not look like the best use of that property, but we do need workforce 282 housing. Miller asked if we grew our population by another 1000 people, how could 283 subsidize our waste treatment plant and subsidize our tax base. Furr suggested they 284 compile their thoughts, bring in the survey, find funding available from the State and 285 Federal government. Van Eeghen reviewed the upcoming meeting of the Housing 286 Committee on January 24, 2024:

289 Barnard reviewed the three parks the Town of Richmond can use for recreation, a very 290 small green at the Old Round Church without the parking lot and sledding hill, the 291 Volunteers Green which is ~22 acres, and Browns Court which is 3.06 acres. Barnard 292 asked the Selectboard to make a motion to not use Browns Court as housing. Barnard 293 requested the Selectboard extend the deadline if indeed they want to hold the housing 294 summit. Storrs reviewed the current estimates and options for pickleball, tennis, and 295 multi-functional courts. Thomas reviewed work on a path around Volunteers Green. 296 Thomas reviewed the frustration and difficulties of dealing with the playground, 297 bandshell, and trails with concerns about future flooding and environmental concerns. 298 Ziskie reviewed the three meetings scheduled for January with the second one all about

304 Furr asked the other Selectboard members their thoughts about a motion. Sander stated it 305 was not competing needs but parallel work. Miller stated no opposition to recreational 306 facilities but didn't want to give up the window for housing. Furr reviewed his concerns 307 about parking for tenants and arrangements where you enforce 6 people showing up to 308 play tennis. Hill stated concern about the space question for a building footprint with 309 pickleball and softball field and not also fit a tennis court, a tennis court without that 310 footprint of housing. Forward stated that he was not convinced that they're mutually exclusive. Forward stated that there was not a full proposal for anything yet and he feels 311 312 responsible for meeting the multiple needs we have in the Town. LaBounty stated that 313 putting in a path has the same environmental impact as putting sidewalks in the 314 floodplain. LaBounty stated that the accessibility for the Bandshell by the federal 315 government trumps anything including our regulations in the floodplain, because they 316 cannot deny access. Clarke encouraged people to think about Browns Court to allow for 317 a playground structure as floods take out the current playground structure. 318 319 Discussion of rules and procedures related to conducting the business of the 320 **Andrews Community Forest Committee** 321 Timestamp: 2:46 322 323 People who participated in discussion: Furr, Schmidt, Hill, Arneson, Forward, Miller, 324 Stokes, Preston 325 326 Furr reviewed the discussion about the best way for the ACFC to work within the Town 327 structure. Furr reviewed that Open Meeting Laws require that discussions with more than 328 a quorum of members take place in public session where everybody can listen. Furr 329 reviewed that the ACFC cannot retroactively authorize money that they've spent and 330 trails that have been constructed but not officially authorized. 331 332 Schmidt reviewed his role as co-chair on the ACFC. Schmidt summarized the ways that 333 the ACFC is setting a precedent of moving forward in productive ways in compliance 334 with all the rules and bylaws. Hill asked if subcommittees unto themselves have quorums 335 and have to be warned with minutes. Arneson stated that he would seek more advice 336 from the attorney. Forward read from the VLCT's Vermont's Open Meeting Law 337 (https://www.vlct.org/topics/vermonts-open-meeting-law) "The Law applies when there 338 is (1) a quorum of a public body; (2) involved in a discussion or taking action; and (3) the 339 subject matter of the discussion is one over which the body has authority or 340 responsibility." Arneson reviewed that typically a subcommittee of this board or others,

- it's less than a quorum. Forward reviewed the bureaucratic reasons as a public purpose tobe transparent. Schmidt asked for guidance on if two people are going to get together to
- make a map then is that a sub-committee. Furr summarized how the proposals from the
- 344 ACFC regarding construction of trails comply with Town zoning standards. Schmidt
- 345 confirmed that the committee has every intention of following every zoning and
- 346 administration suggestion. Stokes reviewed the helpful interactions with many levels of
- Town governance. Preston reviewed how the committee is regulated by a whole bunch
- of different groups.
