 - a) Discuss design options from Black River Design

Police Department Discussion: There was a lively discussion of the extensiveness of the Town Center building renovations that are being devoted to the Police Department. Laurie said that she feels that the discussion has been highjacked by the Police Dept. needs *and wishes*. In her written comments to the committee, Karen Yaggy expressed a concern many committee members agree with that issues relating to the Richmond Police Department are already politicized and that we don't want the appearance of too much space/money being spent there to negatively impact a Bond vote. Jeff commented that Black River's current designs have nearly 3,500 square feet for police and Hinesburg PD only has 2,500 square feet. There was some discussion of whether a sally port is a need or a wish, likewise a locker room. Laurie stated that a separate entrance and better office set up might help the most. Jeff will talk with John & Andrew about thinking about a smaller Police Department footprint prior to our next meeting. These concerns were reflected in the discussion of specific design plans.

Add Sq FT tp Matrix– The committee felt it would be helpful to see the total square footage for the Town Office, Meeting Space, Police, Tenants and Post Office on any future Matrix for the various options.

b) Discuss Library exterior work options

After some discussion, the Committee recommended asking the Selectboard to approve the proposed library exterior work for Summer 2023 per the proposal presented for a project cost of \$65,905 and a final cost to the Town (after the grant is applied) will be \$51,104, which includes 15% contingency and a management fee for the Owner's Rep. Josh will add to the March 20 Selectboard meeting schedule.

c) Update on grant proposals – Bruhn Grant and Dept. of Libraries grants

Laurie reported that she would like to reapply for the Bruhn Historic Preservation grant round with the application due 3/31. Josh will add this to the March 20 Selectboard meeting agenda and Laurie will provide a fact sheet on the program.

Laurie reported that the Department of Libraries has received the guidance on the \$10 million HUD grant program and the date for completion of the projects is 2031 so the grant application process will likely be slower than we had hoped. The DOL is still waiting for approval and rules for the \$10.6 million State ARPA funds which will go to Vermont Libraries. Laurie & Rebecca are completing DOL Needs Assessment (deadline 3/31) which is informational only—grant applications will come later and need Selectboard approval.
